

Documentary Film Screening: Hopper: An American Love Story

Free and open to the public. Reservations are required, space is limited.

Saturday, May 20, at 8:15 p.m.



WHAT: In advance of the <u>Cape Ann Museum's</u> July exhibition, <u>Edward Hopper & Cape Ann: Illuminating an American Landscape</u> including 60+ works presented in partnership with the Whitney Museum of American Art, the Museum will be screening <u>Hopper: An American Love Story</u>. This documentary film offers a deeper look into Hopper's art, his life, and his relationships. Combined with expert interviews, diaries and a startling visual reflection of American life, the film features footage of Cape Ann, where Hopper created watercolors that earned his first critical acclaim, and contributions from Dr. Elliot Bostwick Davis, guest curator of <u>Edward Hopper & Cape Ann</u>. Collectively, these accounts bring to life one of America's most influential artists.

WHEN: Saturday, May 20, at 8:15 p.m.

WHERE: Cape Ann Museum Green, 13 Poplar St., Gloucester, MA

HOW: Attendance is free, but reservations are required, and space is limited. Register for the film screening here.

NOTE: The documentary film screening will be outdoors at the Cape Ann Museum Green, seating will be on the lawn, and attendees are invited to bring their own small lawn chairs or blankets. **All parking will be at O'Maley Middle School with a shuttle**. Due to the limited size of the driveway, please refrain from drop-offs. There is room on the shuttles to bring small beach chairs, blankets, or baskets with snacks. On-site parking is reserved for those with accessibility requirements. Local residents are encouraged, where possible, to walk or ride their bike.

The Cape Ann Museum, founded in 1875, exists to preserve and celebrate the history and culture of the area and to keep it relevant to today's audiences. Spanning 44,000 square feet, the Museum is one of the major cultural institutions on Boston's North Shore welcoming more than 25,000 local, national, and international visitors each year to its exhibitions and programs. In addition to fine art, the Museum's collections include decorative art, textiles, artifacts from the maritime and granite industries, three historic homes, a Library & Archives and a sculpture park in the heart of downtown Gloucester. In Summer 2021, the Museum opened the 12,000 square foot Janet & William Ellery James Center at the Cape Ann Museum Green. The campus also includes three historic buildings – the White-Ellery House (1710), the recently acquired Babson-Alling House (c.1740), and an adjacent Barn (c. 1740), all located on the site at the intersection of Washington and Poplar Streets in Gloucester. CAM Green will re-open in the spring.

The Cape Ann Museum is located at 27 Pleasant Street in Gloucester and is open Tuesday through Saturday, 10:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. and Sunday, 1:00 p.m. to 4:00 p.m. Admission is \$15.00 adults, \$12.00 Cape Ann residents, seniors, and students. Youth (under 18) and Museum members are free. Cape Ann residents can visit for free on the second Saturday of each month.
